Present Situation:	The Helena Police Department applied for and was awarded \$6,670 from the Mason Moore Foundation. The grant application and approval is for the purchase of twenty (20) external ballistic body armor plates.
Background Information:	An application was submitted to the Mason Moore Foundation on January 9, 2024. The application requested funding for twenty (20) external ballistic body armor plates.
	We would like to equip at least one plate in each of our patrol vehicles in order for officers to have easy access to more protection. We currently have a handful of expired rifle-rated plates that are made to go into a carrier system. The carrier system does not work with other outer carrier vests that are currently worn by officers. The requested plates would be able to slide into our current outer carriers easily when responding to an active shooter or other dangerous situation. The officers would also have the option of wearing the plates for the entirety of their shift, if desired. Our current body armor are only rated for protection against pistol ammunition and the requested plates are rated for rifle ammunition protection.
	In March 2024, the HPD was notified of the grant award. Lieutenant Danny David attended the annual awards ceremony in Bozeman, MT where he accepted a check to purchase the body armor plates.
Proposal/Objective:	Accept the Mason Moore Grant Award to purchase twenty (20) external ballistic body armor plates.
<u>Advantage:</u>	We currently have a handful of expired rifle-rated plates that are made to go into a carrier system. The carrier system does not work with other outer carrier vests that are currently worn by officers. The requested plates would be able to slide into our current outer carriers easily when responding to an active shooter or other dangerous situation. What do you need/projected budget: (Please include any quotes you have received and what companies/distributors you received the quote from)

The Helena Police Department is currently in need of twenty (20) external ballistic body armor plates. We currently have \$2,500 budgeted for patrol supplies, most of which is already accounted for or spent. The last two years our budget has taken quite a hit with major cuts throughout the City's budget. This is one area we have had to make cuts. The current need is twenty (20) ballistic plates for our patrol officers. We would like to purchase the HESCO brand M21 Special Threat Plates through Midwest Armor (https://midwestarmor.com) The plates are sold as pairs (2/pack) and per pack are \$676.00. The total cost for 10 packs (20 plates) would be \$6,760 (Attachment D – Pricing Sheet attached). The model number of the plates is M210 Multicurve Special Threat (Attachments A-C information on plates attached).

Why do you need it?

The external ballistic body armor plates are rated for protection against rifle ammunition. Our current body armor is only rated for protection against pistol ammunition. There is an increased usage of AR-15 style rifles by criminals across the country. Living in Montana we are more likely to encounter individuals with high powered rifles. We would like to equip at least one plate in each of our patrol vehicles in order for officers to have easy access to more protection. Currently, we have a handful of expired rifle-rated plates that are made to go into a carrier system. The carrier system does not work with other outer carrier vests that are currently worn by officers. The plates we are wishing for would be able to slide into our current outer carriers easily when responding to an active shooter or other dangerous situation. The officers would also have the option of wearing the plates for the entirety of their shift, if desired.

What other ways have you tried to find funds for this need?

The Helena Police Department has previously tried to include this in our budget through the proper budget process, however, this is something that has been cut out of the budget so that higher priority items may be purchased. We have recently upgraded the firearms in which the officers carry and are in the process of replacing the out-of-date/warranty body worn cameras they currently have. Within the last two years these items come with other costs associated with them

OPTIMUM PLATE SIZE AND SHAPE

HESCO^{*} Body Armor is available in a number of shapes and sizes (size selection is model specific) as well as various curvatures, weights and thicknesses. Torso plates provide front and back chest protection. Side plates are also available for additional protection.

The primary organ to be protected is the heart. Since the heart is located with its apex near the left center chest, for optimum protection the chosen ballistic insert should be wide enough to ensure complete coverage of this area as shown in the illustration on page 7.

Based on fixed plate dimensions, use the Torso Plate Sizing Chart on page 5 as a general guide for choosing the ballistic insert size best suited for you.

MOBILITY AND COMFORT

Once the proper plate size has been determined, it is critical that plates be worn in the correct position on the body so as to allow maximum protection with minimal discomfort.

When in a standing position, the top edge of the plate should rest at the level of the suprasternal / jugular notch (the soft spot right above the sternum), see illustration (page 7). When your finger presses in that spot, the top edge of the plate should touch the bottom of your fingertip.

Where the bottom plate edge rests depends on the wearer's physical height. To insure protection of vital organs and vessels, the bottom edge of the front plate should extend to the bottom of the rib cage, or approximately 4.5 inches (114 mm) from the top of the service belt when standing. For comfort when seated, the space between the bottom plate edge and the service belt closes naturally preventing the insert from riding up into the neck area.

A properly fitted torso plate should not interfere with the comfortable movement of the arms and shoulders.

If a plate is too large it may impede mobility and result in difficulty holding, aiming or discharging a weapon which can result in fatigue and inaccuracy.




Diagram illustrates position of HESCO Armor, Shooter Cut (Large).

POSITIONING THE BACK PLATE

When positioned properly in a plate carrier, the top and bottom edges of the back plate should align with the top and bottom edges of the front plate when viewed from the side. This coverage area provides maximum protection from the rear as well as user comfort while seated or standing. For additional back protection, some users prefer a full cut plate for the rear facing pocket which provides more upper left and right corner area coverage.

SIDE PLATES FOR ADDED PROTECTION

Side plates are available in two sizes and a variety of weights and thicknesses. As the name implies, these plates protect the vulnerable areas of the abdomen from side shots. If worn high enough in the tactical vest they can also provide side protection for the heart.
