ORDINANCE NO. 3303

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING FIRE RESTRICTIONS IN THE CITY OF HELENA

WHEREAS, the City of Helena desires to establish requirements for responsible burning and reduce irresponsible burning, which may endanger the safety and property of persons in the City, through prohibition of hazardous open burning;

WHEREAS, the City of Helena, United States Department of Agriculture, Forest Service, and the Montana Department of Natural Resources and Conservation are the only entities permitted to conduct open burning for the purpose of fuel mitigation within city limits;

WHEREAS, prescribed burning requires planning and safeguards for proper fire control, and the ability for agencies to utilize seasonal prescribed burning operations reduces the personnel and resources needed to control a wildland fire and reduces the severity of losses from wildland fire; and

WHEREAS, the City of Helena wishes to align its fire restrictions with Lewis and Clark County, the Montana Department of Natural Resources and Conservation, and other entities which authorize Stage 1 and Stage 2 fire restrictions.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HELENA, MONTANA:

Ord. No. 3303

That Title 13, Fire Regulations, is established, and Title 13, Chapter 1, of the Helena City Code is hereby enacted as follows:

TITLE 13

FIRE REGULATIONS

CHAPTER 1

FIRE RESTRICTIONS AND PROHIBITIONS:

13-1-1: **DEFINITIONS:** As used in this title, unless the context requires otherwise, the following definitions apply:

FIRE CODE OFFICIAL:

The Fire Chief or the Fire Chief's designee charged with the administration and enforcement of the International Fire Code.

OPEN BURNING:

The burning of materials in an unenclosed space (i.e. open fields, wildland urban interface) wherein products of combustion such as trees, brush, grass, and weeds are emitted directly into the ambient air without passing through a stack or chimney from an enclosed chamber. Open burning does not include road flares, smudge pots, or similar devices associated with safety or occupational uses typically considered open flames, recreational fires, or use of portable outdoor fireplaces. A chamber shall be regarded as enclosed when, during the time combustion occurs, only apertures, ducts, stacks, flues, or chimneys

necessary to provide combustion air and permit the escape of exhaust gas are open.

RECREATIONAL FIRE:

An outdoor fire burning materials not contained in an incinerator, outdoor fireplace, portable outdoor fireplace, barbeque grill or barbeque pit, which has a total fuel area of three feet or less in diameter and two feet or less in height. This kind of fire includes ordinary campfires and other small fires, and is not meant to be used for burning trees, brush, or grass. Burning of trash or rubbish is prohibited.

13-1-2: OPEN BURNING PROHIBITED WITHOUT PERMIT:

- A. A person shall not kindle or maintain or authorize to be kindled or maintained any open burning or within the City of Helena unless conducted in accordance with the conditions of a permit issued by the Fire Code Official and in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance.
- B. A permit shall only be issued to the owner of the land upon which the fire is to be kindled, or alternatively, to the landowner's agent.

13-1-3: RESTRICTIONS ON ALL FIRES:

- A. All fires must be constantly attended until extinguished. A minimum of one portable fire extinguisher (5 pounds or larger) with a minimum 4-A rating or other on-site fire-extinguishing equipment, such as dirt, sand, water barrel, garden hose, or water truck, must be available for immediate utilization.
- B. If any fire grows outside the confined or intended area, the person responsible for the fire, homeowner, and/or permit holder may each be held liable for suppression costs and damages and other civil and criminal penalties as allowed by law.

13-1-4: ADDITIONAL RESTRICTIONS ON OPEN BURNING:

- A. If the Montana Department of Environmental Quality has issued an unhealthy, very unhealthy, or hazardous air quality warning for all or a portion of Lewis and Clark County, an otherwise valid permit issued under this section may not be used. It is the permittee's responsibility to check conditions before burning.
- B. When open burning creates or adds to a hazardous situation, or a required permit for open burning has not been obtained, the Fire Department is authorized to order the extinguishment of the open burning operation.
- C. The location for open burning shall not be less than 50 feet from any structure, and provisions shall be made to prevent the fire from spreading to within 50 feet of any structure. If the recreational fire size is three feet or less in diameter and two feet or less in height, then permitted open burning may be conducted not less than 25 feet from a structure. It is the permittee's responsibility to eliminate conditions within 25 feet of a structure which could cause a fire to spread prior to ignition.

13-1-5: ADDITIONAL RESTRICTIONS ON RECREATIONAL FIRES:

A. Portable outdoor fireplaces must be used in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions and shall not be operated within 15 feet of a structure or combustible material.

13-1-6: ADOPTION OF FIRE RESTRICTIONS:

A. When Lewis and Clark County established fire restrictions pursuant to Montana Code Annotated 7-3-2212, or the State of Montana, Lewis and Clark County, or any other entity with authority to do so have declared Stage 1 or Stage 2 Fire Restriction, the same restrictions apply as if issued by the Commission.

- B. The City Manager and Fire Chief each have the authority to create restrictions and prohibitions on burning in order to remain consistent with other jurisdictions when, in their determination, the following conditions apply:
 - 1. Open burning or recreational fires would be inconsistent with a local air pollution control program established pursuant to Montana Code Annotated 75-2-301:
 - 2. There exists an active wildland or structural fire within Lewis and Clark County that poses a potential threat to properties located within the City of Helena; or
 - 3. There exists other conditions which create a danger to persons or property if open burning or recreational fires are allowed.
- C. A written finding declaring it necessary to restrict burning shall be maintained by the City Clerk and published in all media outlets and social platforms by the Public Information Officer for the City of Helena.

The City of Helena in partnership with Lewis and Clark County is working with key stakeholders on an Integrated Solid Waste Master Plan (Plan) for the City of Helena (City) and Lewis and Clark County (County). The purpose of the Plan is to develop a long-term waste management plan for the City and County with a goal of creating an efficient, comprehensive system that will improve waste diversion, and provide convenient services at the best price for the people of Lewis & Clark County and the City of Helena.

The Plan will evaluate City, County, and private waste management operations for their efficiency and effectiveness, identify alternatives to current practices and their associated cost, and discuss options for funding sources now and into the future. The operations that will be evaluated include, but are not limited to:

- Residential and Commercial Curbside Refuse Collection
- · Residential and Commercial Curbside Composting
- Residential and Commercial Curbside Recycling i. Single Stream, Source Separated, or Other
- · Rental and Use of Roll Off Containers
- · Lewis and Clark County Landfill
- Scratch Gravel Solid Waste District
- Marysville Subdistrict
- Transfer Station
 - i. Commercial, Residential, and Renters Recycling Permits
 - ii. Solid Waste Disposal
 - iii. Recycling
 - iv. Composting Including the Use of Biosolids
 - v. Household Hazardous Waste Management
 - vi. Location and/or Relocation of the Transfer Station
- · Alternative Recycling Locations

City-County Partnerships in Response to COVID-19 Joint City-County Meeting March 7, 2023



In an effort to acknowledge and consolidate efforts by both the City of Helena and Lewis and Clark County with respect to COVID-19 response over the past three years, City and County staff identified the below areas of partnership.

*Note: The monetary amounts noted are approximate and reflect staff's best efforts at compiling data from multiple sources.

Congregate Emergency Sheltering: ~\$100,000 expensed to date; City and County

At the onset of the pandemic, a quickly identified need was to provide non-congregate emergency shelter options for those living in congregate settings. Working with the Elkhorn COAD and numerous nonprofits, the City and County contributed \$25,000 each to support emergency sheltering options for those living in a congregate setting. Rocky Mountain Development Council was the lead in managing the program and funds.

Additionally, the City and County worked together to establish other emergency sheltering solutions, including use of the Fairgrounds, former Jan Shaw Home, and Journey Home. The City and County also obligated \$25,000 each, in City General Funds and ARPA funds, respectively, to provide emergency sheltering during the COVID resurgence in fall 2021/winter 2022.

Public Health Response: ~\$1,442,000 expensed to date; County
Lewis and Clark Public Health (LCPH) is a joint City-County Health department
(along with the City of East Helena) administratively attached to the County.
LCPH served as the primary local organization leading the community's response
to the Covid-19 pandemic. Necessary expenditures included temporary staff (e.g.,
contact tracers and additional nurses), setting up community testing sites and
vaccine clinics, Covid-19 specific communications and technology needs, and
wastewater testing.

Support Services Division: ~\$1,550,000 obligated to date; City and County The Support Services Division is a City- County Department administratively attached to the City. The City and County contributed \$750,000 each to a new CAD RMS system and \$25,000 each to needed repairs for the Mt. Helena radio system.

City-County Building/Law & Justice Center Building Improvements: ~\$1,830,000 obligated to date; City and County

As joint owners of these two buildings, the City and County have jointly funded needed building repairs and upgrades. Projects include the motor vehicle/election remodel and boiler replacement at the LJC. The City allocated \$69,000 from ARPA to help project overages. Contributions to capital projects for both buildings are also currently under consideration.

Information Technology and Services: ~\$130,000 obligated to date; County The IT&S department is a joint City-County department administratively attached to the County. The Covid-19 pandemic required numerous remote work upgrades and equipment to allow City and County employees to maintain essential services while working remotely. Necessary expenditures included cybersecurity and remote network enhancements, GIS enterprise upgrade that allowed for increased functionality of the COVID-19 Hub, laptops and monitors with cameras, and Zoom subscriptions, to name a few.

Fairgrounds Paving and Henderson/Custer Intersection Project: ~\$1,800,000 obligated to date, County and City

Staff from the Fairgrounds, County Public Works, and City Public Works are currently discussing a partnership project that would leverage resources to do paving improvements at the Fairgrounds and a possible roundabout at the intersection of Henderson and Custer.

Minimum Allocation Grant funding, ~\$500,000 transfer from County to City In December 2022, the County transferred ~\$500,000 of the County's Minimum Allocation funds from Montana DNRC to the City for necessary water and sewer improvement upgrades.

Detention Center/Coroner's Office Shared Resources: ~ \$360,000 obligated to date, County

Through the Sheriff's Office, the Detention Center and Coroner's Office serve all County residents; there are no duplicative services within the incorporated cities. CARES and ARPA funds were obligated to both Detention Center and coroner services to help address impacts from the pandemic. Projects included Detention Center remodel overruns due to Covid-19, a body scanner, and a mobile morgue unit.

Community Organizations Serving the Greater Helena Area: ~\$3,300,000 obligated to date; County and City

The Covid-19 pandemic affected everyone and every organization. The nonprofit community was deeply impacted by the pandemic, both in their own operations and in their collective mission to serve others within our community. The County and City have jointly acknowledged the various needs within our nonprofit community. The City provided \$402,000 to Helena Area Community Foundation for their grant-making process and \$200,000 to Montana Business Assistance Connections for their local business revolving loan fund program. The County provided \$275,000 to the 11 Human Resources Task Force agencies and has

obligated \$2,385,000 in ARPA funding to six Helena-area organizations to date. The City is currently considering seven community organization requests with ARPA funds.
