Present Situation:	The City is applying for a \$1.3 million federal Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) grant to complete the east side of South Helena interchange. The proposed "East Side Arterial Connector" will connect I-15 at that interchange to US 12 on the east side of Helena.
	The City Commission provided consensus approval to sign a letter of support for this application at the Feb. 21 administrative meeting.
Background Information:	Efforts to advance construction of the East Side Arterial Connector have been ongoing for more than two decades. The concept was initially proposed in 2002 when the community participated in a planning effort to create a vision for future development of the area east of I-15 and south of US 12. With support of private landowners and developers, the concept of an east side arterial was born. The subsequent I-15 Corridor Final Environmental Impact Statement (FEIS)/Record of Decision (ROD) furthered this vision by approving a new "South Helena" interchange on I-15 to facilitate the future connection. Five years later, the interchange was partially constructed with a stub connection for the east side arterial. Continued efforts were conducted by the city, Montana Department of Transportation (MDT), and current landowner/developer to study the traffic and environmental implications of the project and a preliminary alignment was developed. However, during the economic downturn of 2008, a lack of funding brought the project to a halt.
	Recent development in the adjacent Mountain View Meadows subdivision, increased community interest and investment in reclamation of the former East Helena ASARCO smelter site, population increases, and development constraints in the northern Helena valley have sparked renewed interest in the completion of an east side arterial.
	The city recognizes the need to proactively plan for and manage growth by targeting investments in sustainable public infrastructure to overcome development constraints and protect Helena's valuable natural resources.
	The City of Helena and Lewis and Clark County have jointly determined in our growth policies that most feasible and sustainable location for growth is on the east side of Helena between I-15 and US 12 due to its easy access to municipal services, generally unconstrained land, and proximity to primary regional transportation routes.
	About the RAISE Grant Program: RAISE grants are awarded on a competitive basis for planning or constructing surface transportation infrastructure projects that will improve safety; environmental sustainability; quality of life; mobility and community connectivity; economic competitiveness and opportunity including tourism; state of good repair; partnership and collaboration;

and innovation.

I write to you today with the full backing of the Helena City Commission in support of the City of Helena's application for a 2024 Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity planning grant for the East Side Arterial Connector project.

Efforts to advance construction of the East Side Arterial Connector have been ongoing for more than two decades. The concept was initially proposed in 2002 when the community participated in a planning effort to create a vision for future development of the area east of I-15 and south of US 12. Five years later, the interchange was partially constructed with a stub connection for the east side. Efforts continued by the City and Montana Dept. of Transportation to study the traffic and environmental implications of adding the east side arterial until the economic downturn in 2008 brought the project to a halt.

The city recognizes the need to proactively plan for and manage growth by targeting investments in sustainable public infrastructure to overcome development constraints and protect Helena's valuable natural resources. Completing the East Side Arterial connector will not only maximize the public utility of this interchange, but it will also create much needed regional connectivity, provide traffic congestion relief, and improve safety for motorists and non-motorists who live and work in the Helena area.

Importantly, with the support of private landowners and developers connected to this area, this project will also open up nearly 1,000 acres of open land for new mixed-use and low-income housing development. Helena, like many areas of the country, has experienced incredible growth in the last several years and the lack of affordable housing has reached a crisis level. The city's growth policy identifies the east side of Helena as the most feasible and sustainable area for growth, but development in this area is constrained due to lack of access. Construction of the East Side Arterial will foster that sustainable growth that is so desperately needed.

We appreciate your consideration and partnership in helping the City of Helena take the first step in bringing this project to fruition by funding the funding the planning and design of this important regional project.

This Subaward Agreement, hereinafter referred to as "Subaward", is accepted by City of Helena, hereinafter referred to as the "Subrecipient", according to the following terms and conditions. The purpose of this Subaward is to establish mutually agreeable terms and conditions, specifications, and requirements to grant funds to the Subrecipient.

SECTION 1. PROGRAM PROVISIONS

This Subaward is offered by the Urban and Community Forestry Program of the Montana Department of Natural Resources and Conservation, Forestry and Trust Lands Division, hereinafter referred to as "DNRC".

This Subaward, awarded and administered by the DNRC using grant funds awarded by the USFS, is consistent with the policies, procedures, objectives, and intent of the listed Federal Authority and of the State Urban Forest Resilience Grant Program.

SECTION 2. PROJECT TERMS

Project Name: Helena Sustainable Urban Forest Resilience and Equity

<u>2.1 PERIOD OF PERFORMANCE.</u> This Subaward is effective on the Start Date.

Subrecipient shall have until the Termination Date to complete the project and work described in the Project Scope.

Termination Date:	August 31, 2024

2.2 AGREEMENT EXTENSION. This Subaward may, upon mutual written agreement between the parties, be extended if the funding is still available. No Subaward may be extended past the termination date of the Federal Award funding the project.

The DNRC may allow an extension for completion upon request and showing of good cause by the Subrecipient. Good cause is defined as external factors preventing the Subrecipient from completing the work, including, but not limited to, pandemic, wildland fire, forest closure, extensive and prolonged inoperable weather conditions, the assignment of project equipment and/or crew to the suppression of a wildland fire, or variations in project scope and/or landowner participation.

A request for extension should be submitted in writing no less than thirty (30) days prior to the Termination Date if an extension is to be considered by the DNRC. Any extension will require mutual written agreement between the Subrecipient and the DNRC in the form of an Amendment as provided for below in Section 4.7, Assignment and Amendment.

2.3 PROJECT SCOPE. (a.) Supporting Documents/attachments. The Approved Project Proposal for this Subaward to the Subrecipient is attached as Appendix B, which is incorporated herein by reference. Appendix B describes the specific project activities allowed under this Subaward for completion of a Montana Urban Forest Equity project in or near the City of Helena, Montana. In addition, Subrecipient must fulfill the terms specified in Appendix C, Additional Requirements to Proposal, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. Funding will not be provided if the requirements outlined in Appendices B and C are not fulfilled.

(b.) The Subrecipient must use the proceeds provided pursuant to this Subaward to perform allowable activities identified in the Approved Project Proposal. *The key outcome of the project is a 3-pronged approach to enhance canopy cover and diversity in underserved areas within the City of Helena. The project will include installation of a tree holding facility, planting projects in underserved neighborhoods, and education and outreach.*

<u>2.4 PROJECT BUDGET.</u> The Subaward budget period runs concurrently with the Period of Performance. Subaward funds are allocated to the following budget categories:

Total payment for all purposes under this Subaward shall not exceed Twenty-Two Thousand Eight Hundred and no/100 Dollars (\$22,800.00).

This Subaward requires a match of 3:1. For every \$3 of federal funds issued under this Subaward, the Subrecipient or its project partners must provide \$1 in non-federal funds. No federal funds may be used to satisfy the match requirement of this Subaward.

Match will be met in the categories of Subrecipient salary/wages/benefits and operating expenses in the form of cash contribution or in-kind services related to the project. Claimed match must be sufficiently documented to show compliance with federal requirements and to demonstrate how it supports the Subaward project. The DNRC will determine whether match documentation submitted is adequate and may require additional documentation before approval.

The Subrecipient may transfer up to ten percent (10%) of the Total Subaward Amount between Direct Costs budget categories as needed to complete the project. The Subrecipient must notify the DNRC of such transfers. Transfers between budget categories in excess of ten percent (10%) of the Subaward amount must be requested by the Subrecipient, approved by the DNRC, and documented in an amendment to the Subaward.

The indirect cost rate is shown above, expressed as a percentage of indirect costs to direct costs. Unless the rate has been formalized in a Negotiated Indirect Cost Rate Agreement (NICRA) between the Subrecipient and its cognizant federal agency, the rate shown above is hereby approved by the DNRC for the term of this Subaward and may not be changed except via written amendment.

Revenue, defined here as gross income earned through project activities minus costs borne by the Subrecipient to earn the income, such as the sale of harvested timber, must be declared to the DNRC prior to the request of the final disbursement of funds. If the DNRC determines the revenue to be program income (PI), DNRC will direct the Subrecipient to handle PI in one or more of the following ways. (a) The PI may be incorporated into the project and used to meet a

matching requirement of the Subaward; the amount of the federal funds awarded remains the same. (b) The PI may be incorporated into the project and used to increase the scope and/or scale of work completed. Increase in completed activities as described in Section 2.3, Project Scope will be commensurate with value of PI; the amount of the federal funds awarded remains the same. (c) The PI may be retained by the Subrecipient, and the value deducted from total allowable costs to determine the net allowable costs available under the Subaward; the amount of the federal funds awarded will decrease at 1:1. (d) The PI may be handled by the Subrecipient in a manner required by state statute, rule, or regulation.

When procuring goods or services with Subaward funds, the Subrecipient must follow applicable procurement procedures, found in 2 CFR 200 §§ 200.317 – 200.327 of the <u>Uniform</u> <u>Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, And Audit Requirements For Federal Awards</u>.

2.5 DISBURSEMENTS. Subrecipient shall submit claims for disbursement of Subaward funds. Documentation of reimbursable costs incurred and paid must be submitted with the request. Documentation may include, but is not limited to, itemized receipts, vendor invoices, inspection certificates, transaction ledgers or other financial reports that clearly show expenditures, payroll records, copies of checks, bank statements, and other forms of proof of payment. The DNRC will determine whether documentation submitted adequately supports the disbursement request and may require additional documentation before approving payment. Reimbursement of Subrecipient's expenditures will only be made for expenses included in the Approved Project Proposal, that are clearly and accurately supported by the Subrecipient's records.

Subrecipient should seek timely reimbursement of claimed costs incurred under this Subaward. A minimum of one Request must be submitted annually to the DNRC. The annual period begins on the Subaward effective date. In the event no reimbursable costs are incurred in an annual period, a Request for zero dollars (\$0.00) listing current Subaward balances should be submitted to the DNRC. Request for final disbursement of Subaward funds is due no later than 30 days following the Subaward termination date.

The DNRC may withhold up to ten percent (10%) of the total authorized Subaward amount until both the project tasks (outlined in Section 2.3 and Appendix B) and the Final Report (required by Section 2.6) are completed by the Subrecipient and approved by the DNRC.

2.6 REPORTS. Subrecipient shall immediately notify the DNRC of developments that significantly impact the activities supported under this Subaward. Notification must be given in the case of problems, delays, or adverse conditions that materially impair the ability of the Subrecipient to meet the objectives of the Subaward. The notification must include a statement on action taken or contemplated, and any assistance needed to resolve the situation including requests for scope and/or timeline modifications as provided for below in Section 4.7, Assignment and Amendment.

A midterm progress report must be submitted to the DNRC during the term of this Subaward. The report will provide status information for project implementation objective(s). Project status information will include, at a minimum, progress completed, costs incurred, funds remaining, and projected completion date. Significant problems encountered must be noted. **The midterm report is due on May 31, 2024.** The DNRC will review the report for completeness and accuracy and will notify the Subrecipient if changes are necessary.

A Final Report that details the project status, results, accomplishments, and financial status will

be submitted to the DNRC by the Subrecipient for approval upon project completion. Final reports are due no later than 30 days following the Subaward termination date.

Final disbursement of Subaward funds is contingent upon DNRC's receipt and approval of the following documents: 1) Final Report, 2) DNRC Regional Urban Forester Project Inspection Form, if required, and 3) Completed Project Report Form, which is available to download from the DNRC Urban Forestry website.

2.7 METHOD OF SUBMISSION. All claims for disbursement of Subaward funds as described in Section 2.5 Disbursements; and all reports as described in Section 2.6 Reports must be submitted to the email address: DNRCForestryGrants@mt.gov for processing. Messages to DNRCForestryGrants@mt.gov should prominently list the Subaward Agreement Number to aid in identification. The DNRC is not responsible for the receipt and processing of reports or disbursement requests submitted via an alternative method. If the required method of submission changes during the Period of Performance of the Subaward, the DNRC will provide thirty (30) days' notice in writing.

SECTION 3. INSURANCE TERMS

<u>3.1 WORKER'S COMPENSATION.</u> The Subrecipient, its employees and contractors, are not covered by the DNRC's Workers' Compensation Insurance. The Subrecipient is responsible for making sure that it and its employees are covered by Workers' Compensation Insurance and that its contractors are in compliance with the coverage provisions of the Workers' Compensation Act.

<u>3.2 INDEMNITY AND LIABILITY (HOLD HARMLESS / INDEMNIFICATION).</u> Subrecipient agrees to be financially responsible for any audit exception or other financial

Subrecipient agrees to be financially responsible for any audit exception or other financial loss to the DNRC and the State of Montana which occurs due to the negligence, intentional acts, or failure by Subrecipient and/or its agents, employees, subcontractors, or representatives to comply with the terms of this Subaward.

Subrecipient hereby agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the DNRC and the State of Montana and its agents from and against any and all claims, demands, or actions for damages to property or injury to persons or other damage to persons or entities arising out of, or resulting from the performance of this Subaward or the results of this Subaward, provided such damage to property or injury to persons is due to the negligent act or omission, recklessness, or intentional misconduct of Subrecipient or any of its employees and agents. This Subaward is not intended to relieve a liable party of financial or legal responsibility.

3.3 INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS. General Requirements. The Subrecipient shall maintain for the duration of this Subaward, at its cost and expense, liability insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property-which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work by the Subrecipient, agents, employees, representatives, assigns, or subcontractors. This insurance shall cover such claims as may be caused by any negligent act or omission of the Subrecipient or its officers, agents, representatives, assigns or subcontractors.

<u>Specific Requirements for General Liability</u>. The Subrecipient shall purchase and maintain occurrence coverage with minimum combined single limits for bodily injury, personal injury, and property damage of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 aggregate per year, or as established by statutory tort limits of \$750,000 per claim and \$1,500,000 per occurrence as provided by a self-insurance pool insuring counties, cities, or towns, as authorized under Section 2-9-211, MCA.

SECTION 4. DNRC GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

4.1 DNRC's ROLE. The DNRC will monitor project expenditures for payment eligibility. The DNRC assumes no responsibility for the Subrecipient's obligation to faithfully perform the tasks and activities required by this Subaward. The DNRC assumes no responsibility for verifying the right of the Subrecipient to conduct project activities on properties included in the Subaward project. The Subrecipient is responsible for obtaining all appropriate permissions to conduct activities. In the event content in the approved project proposal differs from or conflicts with terms presented elsewhere in the Subaward, the Subaward text takes precedence.

The Subrecipient may contact the DNRC's Program Representative, identified in Section 6. Principal Contacts and Authorizations, for guidance related to administration of the terms of this Subaward.

The Subrecipient may contact the Technical Specialist if one is listed in Section 6. Principal Contacts and Authorizations, for assistance with project execution. The roles and responsibilities of the technical specialist include but are not limited to, providing technical assistance to the Subrecipient to achieve intended outcomes of the project; conducting reviews of project plans, activities, and accomplishments upon request of the Subrecipient or as often as deemed necessary by the DNRC; and assisting the Subrecipient in complying with Montana's Forest Practices Laws and voluntary Best Management Practices in the course of carrying out project activities. If no Technical Specialist is listed, the Subrecipient may contact the Program Representative to provide these services.

4.2. AVAILABILITY OF SUBAWARD FUNDS. The Subrecipient acknowledges and understands that Subaward funds become available based on federal awards to the DNRC. Costs incurred by the Subrecipient or any beneficiary prior to this Subaward are not eligible for reimbursement but may be counted as match funds upon prior written approval by the DNRC.

The commitment by the DNRC to expend money is contingent upon the DNRC receiving funds under the federal award. No liability shall accrue to the DNRC or its officials in the event such funds are not appropriated or issued as authorized in the federal award. The DNRC may, at its sole discretion, issue a temporary stop-work order, reduce the scope of project activities, or terminate this Subaward if appropriated funding is reduced or unavailable for any reason. The DNRC will provide the Subrecipient at least 10 days' notice for a stop-work order and at least 30 days' notice if a reduction in scope or termination is determined to be necessary due to the unavailability of funds. Until the DNRC notifies the Subrecipient that obligated funds are unavailable, the DNRC will continue to comply with the terms of this Subaward, including the disbursement of funds for eligible expenses incurred by the Subrecipient up to the specified date and time provided in a written notice.

<u>4.3 RECORDS AND AUDITS.</u> The Subrecipient must maintain appropriate and adequate records showing complete entries of all receipts, disbursements, and other transactions relating

to this Subaward for three (3) years after the later of either the final Subaward payment or the termination of this Subaward. The DNRC, the Montana Legislative Audit Division, or the Montana Legislative Fiscal Division may, at any reasonable time, audit all records, reports, and other documents that the Subrecipient maintains under or during the course of this Subaward to ensure compliance with all terms and conditions of the Subaward.

During the period of performance and extending after this Subaward is terminated and closed, the DNRC reserves the right to disallow and recover an appropriate amount after fully considering any recommended disallowances resulting from an audit or other review.

4.4 PROJECT MONITORING AND ACCESS FOR INSPECTION AND MONITORING. The DNRC or its agents may monitor and inspect all phases and aspects of the Subrecipient's

The DNRC or its agents may monitor and inspect all phases and aspects of the Subrecipient's performance to determine compliance with this Subaward, including but not limited to the adequacy of records and accounts, project progress and accomplishments, and adherence to any project specifications. The Subrecipient shall accommodate requests for the DNRC access to sites and records with due consideration for safety, private property rights, and convenience of everyone involved. Inadequate accommodation of requests, as determined by the DNRC, may be viewed as a failure to comply as outlined in Section 4.9.

4.5 EMPLOYMENT STATUS. The DNRC is not an owner or general contractor for the project. The DNRC does not control the work activities or worksite of the Subrecipient or any contractors that might be engaged by the Subrecipient for completion of the project. The Subrecipient is independent from and is not an employee, officer, or agent of the DNRC. The Subrecipient shall ensure that all its employees complete the I-9 form to certify they are eligible for lawful employment under the Immigration and Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. 1324(a)). The Subrecipient shall comply with regulations regarding certification and retention of the completed forms.

4.6 COPYRIGHTING AND GOVERNMENT RIGHT TO USE. The Subrecipient is granted sole and exclusive right to copyright any publications developed with funding provided under this subaward. The State of Montana and the USFS reserve a royalty-free, nonexclusive, and irrevocable right to reproduce, publish, or otherwise use, and to authorize others to use the work for government purposes. This provision includes any right of copyright to which the Subrecipient purchases ownership with any federal contributions. No original text or graphics produced by the State of Montana or the USFS shall be copyrighted.

4.7 ASSIGNMENT AND AMENDMENT. The Subrecipient may not assign or transfer any portion of this Subaward without the DNRC's express written consent. Amendments will be in writing, signed by both parties, and attached as an integral component of this Subaward. This Subaward may be terminated by the mutual written consent of both parties. If this Subaward is terminated, the Subrecipient may not submit claims for reimbursement for costs incurred beyond the mutually agreed to termination date.

4.8 COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE STATE AND LOCAL LAWS. All work performed under this Subaward must fully comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, rules, and regulations, including but not limited to, the Montana Human Rights Act. Any subletting or subcontracting by the Subrecipient subjects subcontractors to the same provision. In accordance with 49-3-207, MCA, the Subrecipient agrees that the hiring of persons to perform this Subaward will be made on the basis of merit and qualifications and without discrimination based upon race, color, religion, creed, political ideas, sex, age, marital status, physical or mental disability, or national origin of the persons performing this Subaward. It shall be the

Subrecipient's responsibility to obtain all permits, licenses, or authorizations that might be required from government authorities for completion of the project. Procurement of labor, services, supplies, materials and equipment shall be conducted according to applicable federal, state, and local statutes. The DNRC's signature on this Subaward does not guarantee the approval or issuance of any permits, licenses, or any other form of authorization to take action for which the Subrecipient must apply with the DNRC or any other government entity and submit to the DNRC to fulfill the terms of this Subaward.

4.9 FAILURE TO COMPLY. If the Subrecipient fails to comply with the terms and conditions of this Subaward, the DNRC may terminate this Subaward and/or refuse additional disbursements of subaward funds and/or take legal action to recover disbursed subaward funds. Such termination will become a consideration in the DNRC's evaluation of future applications for subawards.

<u>4.10 MONTANA LAW AND VENUE.</u> Any action or judicial proceeding for enforcement of the terms of this Subaward shall be instituted only in the courts of Montana and shall be governed by the laws of Montana. Venue shall be in the First Judicial District, Lewis and Clark County, Montana.

SECTION 5. FEDERAL FUNDING SOURCE TERMS AND CONDITIONS

5.1 COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE LAWS. (a.) (e.) The City of Helena Urban Forestry proposed using the collaborative funding locally in a three-pronged approach to enhance canopy cover and diversity in underserved areas.

- Installation of irrigation system and Pot in Pot growing system in tree holding facility.
 - This will allow us to order more wholesale trees to be used for replacement and planting projects not only for this project but also future projects.
 - It will allow us to utilize more labor on planting and development projects rather than caring for trees in the lot which can be a significant investment.
- Identified underserved neighborhoods selected for planting projects.
 - Work with local neighborhood groups to promote and educate residents on planting projects.
 - High school Green Group
 - Helena Growing Friends
 - Helena Citizens Council
 - Planting project would be whole street boulevard plantings with the aim to create tree lined streets.
 - Work with volunteers to water trees
 - Purchase more effective watering systems
 - Tree Gators for each tree
 - Higher capacity mobile watering tank to make watering more efficient.
- Education and Outreach with Urban Forestry Staff.
 - Targeting high risk neighborhoods identified in the Project Proposal.
 - The City of Helena will commit a seasonal employee 544 hours for education and outreach.
 - We will work with property owners and volunteers for tree care and planting education.
 - Outreach seasonal employee will provide follow up care and pruning.

The aim is that these 3 project areas work to support each other, not only for this project but to strengthen and increase sustainability for future City of Helena projects. The project aligns well with the Montana State Forest Action Plan while focusing primarily on equitable allocation in high risk and underserved areas not only through public outreach and education but highly visible and tangible public planting projects.




- 1) Tree planting specifications Part (A)
- 2) Final Work Inspection Form -Part (B)

Part (A) – Tree Planting

All tree planting projects must follow the Best Management Practices for Tree Planting, a special companion publication to the ANSI A300 Part 6: Tree, Shrub, and Other Woody Plant Maintenance – Standard Practices (Transplanting). This booklet covers bare root, containerized, and balled and burlap tree stock. Specifications are summarized here:

- □ **Time of Year** The ideal time to plant a tree is when it is in a dormant condition, either in early spring before bud-break, or in the fall, after leaves have dropped. Weather conditions at these times are generally cool, allowing plants to establish new roots before the onset of harsh temperatures.
- Location Visualize the tree in 20 years. Consider site restrictions (available growing space, soil, pavement, overhead/underground utilities, etc.) Call local utility services at least 2 days prior to digging to locate underground utilities. (Usually 811 or 1-800-424-5555 in MT)





- □ Site preparation Dig a hole three times as wide as the root ball, but not deeper. Amending soil is not necessary unless planting in disturbed sites or poor soil quality. Break up compacted soil on sides of the hole, and leave bottom firm.
- □ **Tree preparation** 1) Identify root flare part of the trunk where the roots spread out at the base of the tree. Root flare should be visible after the tree has been planted. You may have to remove some soil from the top of the root ball to find the flare. 2) Cut away strings and burlap or plastic from around the trunk. If tree is container grown, carefully remove container.
- Tree placement Lift tree into planting space by the root ball, not the trunk. Ensure tree is at proper depth and never plant too deep. Trunk flare and top of root ball should be at grade. Balance tree upright at center of planting space. Pull back burlap as much as possible without removing soil from the root ball.
- Fill with soil Fill the hole while watering, periodically pausing to gently tamp base, ensuring the tree is firmly settling in the planting space.
 Finish filling soil just below the trunk flare.
- Mulch Apply 2 inches of organic material i.e. wood chips or similar composted material. Leave bare soil around the trunk. Remove any tags, wrap, flagging, etc. from the tree. Such items were only meant as protection during transportation and installation.
- Only stake if necessary Trees will establish more quickly and develop stronger trunk and root systems if they are not staked at the time of planting. However, protective staking may be required on sites where equipment, animal damage, vandalism or windy conditions are concerns. Use a wide, flexible tying material to avoid injuring trunk and allow the



tree to move or sway. Remove staking and ties after one year.

- Establishment Do not fertilize at planting time. Water regularly throughout the first growing season (about once a week unless significant rainfall is received), but do not overwater. Keep lawn mowers and string trimmers away from tree to avoid wounding bark. Only prune dead or injured branches at time of planting.
- Long term care & protection Have a 3-year annual inspection program to replace mulch, provide small tree training (light pruning cuts), and check for signs of stress, insects, disease, or vandalism. Keep trunk area free and clear of weeds and other competing vegetation. Put a fence around tree if site is a feeding ground for rabbits, deer, or other wildlife.

Part (B) – Project Inspection Form

Once the Subaward Project is complete, the Subrecipient must contact the DNRC regional urban forester to schedule a final project inspection. The inspection will verify that all required work has been completed and performed in accordance with state and program specifications. The Project Inspection Form must be completed by the DNRC regional urban forester or duly designated DNRC representative. Upon completion and submittal of the Project Inspection Form, a final payment of subaward agreement funds, including any funds that may have been withheld from earlier payment requests, is made to the Subrecipient. If the project is not inspected and approved by the DNRC regional urban forester, or deficiencies are found during inspection and not corrected, funds may be withheld from the Subrecipient.

Present Situation:	The Helena Police Department and Fire Department need additional staff to meet the demand for service in the City. Both departments recently completed studies by independent consulting firms, which identified the gaps in staffing. In addition, the studies confirmed the need for a third fire station to meet the City's population and geographic growth. The current level of revenue the City of Helena receives from property taxes does not support the community's current public safety service needs or the needs of the community in the future.			
Background Information:	The City of Helena Police Department conducted a staffing study with a consultant that recommends additional Patrol Officers. HPD then organized a Staffing Study Committee to review the entire Police Department operation and provided recommendations on additional staffing needs.			
	Additionally, the Helena Fire Department completed a comprehensive Master Plan in 2022 with a consultant. A Planning Committee was then formed, which created an executive summary with key recommendations.			
	The recommendations for both the Police and Fire Departments were presented in administrative meetings in 2023 after they were completed. On December 13, 2023 and January 17, 2024, City staff outlined for the Commission in an administrative meeting, the funding needs and multiple scenarios for addressing those needs, which culminated on February 7, 2023, with consensus direction from the City Commission to proceed with the resolution being considered at this meeting tonight.			
Proposal/Objective:	The City of Helena proposes to expand public safety services with the addition of 31.66 mill levies to hire 9 police department staff and an additional 15 firefighters. The City also proposes to issue and sell General Obligation Bonds that would be used to construct a fire station, training center, and equip them with what is necessary for serving the residents of the City. The City proposes to levy 5.66 bonds to fund the debt service for constructing the new fire station.			
<u>Advantage:</u>	The residents of the City of Helena will see an improvement in public safety services provided by the Police and Fire Departments. The capacity of both departments will substantially increase to accommodate the City's future growth.			

Notable Energy Impact:	No notable energy impact in requesting ballot measures to be placed on the June 4, 2024 ballot that will already be an in-person primary election.
<u>Disadvantage:</u>	Property owners will see an increase in taxes depending on the value of their home. To give an idea of the current impact, if the mills and bonds were passed today, a home with a value of \$100,000 would see a property tax bill increase of \$50.38 per year. A home with the value of \$300,000 would see a property tax bill increase of \$151.13 per year, and a home with the value of \$600,000 would see a property tax bill increase of \$302.26 per year.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COMMISSION SUBMITTING TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF HELENA, MONTANA, THE QUESTIONS OF (I) ISSUING GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS OF THE CITY IN A TOTAL PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF UP TO SEVEN MILLION AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$7,000,000.00) FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING COSTS OF ACQUIRING A SITE AND DESIGNING, CONSTRUCTING, FURNISHING, AND EQUIPPING THEREON A NEW FIRE STATION, TO INCLUDE A TRAINING FACILITY, AND PAYING COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH THE SALE AND ISSUANCE OF THE BONDS; AND (II) PERMANENTLY LEVYING MILLS TO PAY COSTS OF PUBLIC SAFETY SERVICES, INCLUDING OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE COSTS OF THE CITY POLICE AND FIRE DEPARTMENTS, TO INCLUDE ADDITIONAL POLICE DEPARTMENT PERSONNEL AND FIREFIGHTERS, EQUIPMENT, AND RELATED PUBLIC SAFETY COSTS AND EXPENSES

BE IT RESOLVED, by the City Commission (the "Commission") of the City of Helena, Montana (the "City") as follows:

Section 1. <u>Recitals</u>. It is hereby found, determined and declared as follows:

1.01. <u>Authorization</u>. The City is authorized pursuant to Section 7-7-4221, Montana Code Annotated, upon approval of the electorate of the City, to issue general obligation bonds pledging the general credit of the City for any purpose authorized by law, provided that such indebtedness will not cause the total indebtedness of the City to exceed 2.5% of the total assessed value of taxable property of the City, determined as provided in Section 15-8-111, Montana Code Annotated, ascertained by the last assessment for state and county taxes. In addition, pursuant to Section 7-7-4223, Montana Code Annotated, the Commission is authorized to call a bond election by adopting a resolution to that effect. The Commission is also authorized pursuant to Section 15-10-425, Montana Code Annotated, to increase its mill levies for a specific purpose by conducting a mill levy election as prescribed by law.

1.02. <u>Proposed Project and Bonds</u>. The Commission has determined that the demand for public safety services has increased and the current City facilities are inadequate to meet the demand. To address these deficiencies in the community, the Commission hereby determines there should be submitted to the qualified electors of the City the question of whether the Commission shall be authorized to sell and issue general obligation bonds of the City in one or more series to obtain funds for the purpose of paying costs of acquiring a site and designing, constructing, furnishing, and equipping thereon a new fire station, to include a training facility, and related improvements and costs, and paying costs associated with the sale and issuance of the bonds, which bonds shall bear interest at rates to be determined at the time of sale, payable semiannually over a term not to exceed twenty years for each series of bonds, and subject to redemption as required by law.

It is the judgment of the Commission that up to \$7,000,000.00 in principal amount of general obligation bonds will be necessary to carry out the purpose set forth above. It is also the judgment and determination of the Commission that such general obligation bonds may be issued in multiple series, each series payable during a term not to exceed twenty (20) years and subject to redemption as provided by law.

1.03. <u>Debt Limitation</u>. The Commission has determined that the issuance of general obligation bonds in the total principal amount of Seven Million and No/100 Dollars (\$7,000,000.00) together with the outstanding principal amounts of all other general obligation indebtedness of the City will not cause the City to exceed its general obligation indebtedness limitation, which is currently calculated to be \$152,450,834 (i.e., 2.50% x \$6,098,033,385).

1.04. <u>Mill Levy</u>. In addition, the City Commission has determined that the City's current mill levy authority is inadequate to fund current and future public safety services necessary for a growing community. The Commission has therefore determined that it is in the best interest of the City to seek authority for a permanent mill levy increase to pay costs of public safety services, including operation and maintenance costs of the City police and fire departments, to include additional police department personnel and firefighters, equipment, and related public safety costs and expenses, by presenting to the voters a mill levy question.

Section 2. <u>Calling of the Election</u>. The Commission hereby calls and directs that an election be held in conjunction with the primary election on June 4, 2024, for the purpose of voting on the following questions:

Proposed General Obligation Bonds for New Fire Station

Shall the City Commission of the City of Helena, Montana (the "City") be authorized to sell and issue general obligation bonds of the City in one or more series in a total principal amount of up to Seven Million and No/100 Dollars (\$7,000,000.00) bearing interest at rates to be determined at the time of sale, payable semiannually over a term not to exceed twenty years for each series of bonds, for the purpose of paying costs of acquiring a site and designing, constructing, furnishing, and equipping thereon a new fire station, to include a training facility, and related improvements and costs, and paying costs associated with the sale and issuance of the bonds?

If this bond proposition passes, it is estimated that property taxes on a home with an assessed market value for tax purposes of \$100,000 would increase by \$7.64 in the first year, of \$300,000 would increase by \$22.92 in the first year, and of \$600,000 would increase by \$45.84 in the first year. An increase in property taxes may lead to an increase in rental costs.

The Commission has determined that it is in the best interests of the City to seek authority for a permanent mill levy increase to fund current and future public safety services by presenting to the voters the following question:

Proposed Mill Levy for Public Safety Services

Shall the City Commission of the City of Helena, Montana (the "City") be authorized to levy permanently up to 31.66 mills per year, currently raising approximately \$3,203,832 annually, for the purpose of paying costs of public safety services, including operation and maintenance costs of the City police and fire departments, to include additional police department personnel and firefighters, equipment, and related public safety costs and expenses?

If this mill levy proposition passes, it is estimated that property taxes on a home with an assessed market value for tax purposes of \$100,000 would increase by \$42.74 per year, of \$300,000 would increase by \$128.22 per year, and of \$600,000 would increase by \$256.44 per year. An increase in property taxes may lead to an increase in rental costs.

Section 3. <u>Assumptions Underlying Tax Impact</u>. As required by law, each of the bond question and mill levy question contains a tax impact statement. The tax impact statement regarding the bonds assumes that (i) the dollar amount raised by the levy of 1 mill is equal to the estimated dollar amount of 1 mill as set forth in the City's fiscal year 2024 budget, (ii) the bonds are issued in one series and in the maximum principal amount set forth in the bond ballot question, (iii) the term of the bonds is 20 years, and (iv) the average annual interest rate on the bonds is 5.00%. The tax impact statement regarding the mill levy assumes that the dollar amount raised by the levy of 1 mill is equal to the estimated dollar amount of 1 mill as set forth in the City's fiscal year 2024 budget.

Section 4. <u>Conduct of Election</u>. All qualified electors of the City shall be entitled to vote at the bond election and mill levy election. The Clerk of the Commission is hereby authorized and directed to give notice of the call and details of this election to the Lewis and Clark County Election Administrator promptly and in any event on or before the date required by the Lewis and Clark County Election Administrator. The Lewis and Clark County Election Administrator is requested to give notice of the close of registration and thereafter prepare printed lists of the qualified electors in the City entitled to vote in the election in the City and to conduct the election in the form and manner prescribed by law.

Section 5. <u>Notice of Election</u>. The Clerk of the Commission or the Lewis and Clark County Election Administrator, as appropriate, is hereby authorized and requested to cause notice of the call and holding of the election to be given by publishing notice at least three times no earlier than 40 days and no later than 10 days before the election in the *Helena Independent Record*, a newspaper of general circulation in Lewis and Clark County. The notice of election as published shall read substantially as shown on <u>Exhibit A</u> hereto (which is incorporated by reference and made a part hereof), with such additions or deletions or updates as are determined necessary or desirable.

Section 8. <u>Reimbursement Expenditures</u>.

(a) The United States Department of Treasury has promulgated final regulations governing the use of proceeds of tax-exempt bonds, all or a portion of which are to be used to reimburse the City for project expenditures paid by the City prior to the date of issuance of such bonds. Those regulations (Treasury Regulations, Section 1.150-2) (the "Regulations") require that the City adopt a statement of official intent to reimburse an original expenditure not later than 60 days after payment of the original expenditure. The Regulations also generally require that the bonds be issued and the reimbursement allocation made from the proceeds of the bonds within 18 months (or three years, if the reimbursement bond issue qualifies for the "small issuer" exception from the arbitrage rebate requirement) after the later of (i) the date the expenditure is paid or (ii) the date the project is placed in service or abandoned, but (unless the issue qualifies for the "small issuer" exception from the arbitrage rebate requirement) in no event more than three years after the date the expenditure is paid. The Regulations generally permit reimbursement of capital expenditures and costs of issuance of the bonds.

(b) Other than (i) expenditures to be paid or reimbursed from sources other than the bonds, (ii) expenditures permitted to be reimbursed under the transitional provision contained in Section 1.150-2(j)(2) of the Regulations, (iii) expenditures constituting preliminary expenditures within the meaning of Section 1.150-2(f)(2) of the Regulations, or (iv) expenditures in a "de minimus" amount (as defined in Section 1.150-2(f)(1) of the Regulations), no expenditures for a project within the scope of this resolution have been paid by the City before the date 60 days before the date of adoption of this resolution.

(c) The City reasonably expects to reimburse the expenditures made for costs of such a project out of the proceeds of bonds in an estimated maximum aggregate principal amount of up to 7,000,000 after the date of payment of all or a portion of the costs of such a project. All reimbursed expenditures shall be capital expenditures, a cost of issuance of the bonds or other expenditures eligible for reimbursement under Section 1.150-2(d)(3) of the Regulations.

(d) As of the date hereof, there are no City funds reserved, allocated on a long-term basis or otherwise set aside (or reasonably expected to be reserved, allocated on a long-term basis or otherwise set aside) to provide permanent financing for the expenditures related to such a project, other than pursuant to the issuance of the bonds. The statement of intent contained in this resolution, therefore, is determined to be consistent with the City's budgetary and financial circumstances as they exist or are reasonably foreseeable on the date hereof.

(e) The Chief Financial Officer shall be responsible for making the "reimbursement allocations" described in the Regulations, being generally the transfer of the appropriate amount of proceeds of the bonds to reimburse the source of temporary financing used by the City to make prior payment of the costs of the project. Each allocation shall be evidenced by an entry on the

official books and records of the City maintained for the bonds or the project and shall specifically identify the actual original expenditure being reimbursed.

A RESOLUTION OF INTENTION TO ESTABLISH FEES TO BE CHARGED AT THE BILL ROBERTS MUNICIPAL GOLF COURSE REPEALING RESOLUTION NO. 20794

WHEREAS, the City of Helena Parks Department with the Bill Roberts Municipal Golf Course Advisory Board has recommended changes in the charges imposed upon users of the golf course; and

WHEREAS, it appears to be in the best interests of the City of Helena, Montana, and the inhabitants thereof, that the Helena City Commission hold a public hearing on the implementation of fees shown in Exhibit A.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HELENA, MONTANA:

Section 1. That it is the intention of the City of Helena to supersede Resolution No. 20794 establish updated user fees for the Bill Roberts Golf Course as shown in Exhibit A;

Additionally, the following policies will remain in effect; <u>REFUNDS</u>: No refunds will be given for lost or stolen punch cards or season passes.

Refunds for unused portions of punch cards or season passes may be granted by the City Manager, upon certification from a licensed physician that the holder's medical condition prevents the holder from being able to participate in golf for the remainder of the season. If a refund is granted, the refund will be pro-rated,

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less the number of documented played rounds based on the current green fee value. No refunds will be considered after August 1st.

Passes and punch cards will not be extended to the next season. Punch cards are transferrable but are only good for one golf season.

Rain checks may be issued for lost rounds of play due to course conditions that pose a threat to the safety of the golfers or due to an imminent medical emergency of a golfer. Rain check refunds will not be issued after 5 holes of completed golf for 9 holes of play and 13 holes of completed golf for 18 holes of play.

DONATIONS: The City Manager may authorize the Bill Roberts Golf Course golf professional to donate up to 35 rounds of "2 for 1" free golf per golf season to promote the Bill Roberts Golf Course at charitable events.

The City Manager may authorize the Bill Roberts Golf Course golf professional to donate up to \$1,000 of pro shop merchandise valued at retail value for charitable purposes per golf season.

Based on professional courtesy and golf course practices throughout the industry, the City Manager may authorize the issuance of complimentary golf privileges to visiting golf professionals and visiting golf course superintendents.

PROMOTIONS: The City Manager may authorize the Bill Roberts Golf Course professional to implement promotional programs that result in discounted rates for the purpose of increasing under-utilized course play times. Promotions may include "loyalty member" programs, 2 for 1 specials, etc.

Section 2. The following definitions apply:

"Active Military" is a person who is on full-time duty in active military service of the United States. This includes members of the reserve components serving on active duty or fulltime training duty but does not include full-time National Guard duty.

"Couple" is two adults who cohabit and share a single

household.

"Family" is all members of the same household, including dependents, who are eighteen years old or younger.

"Junior" is a person who is eighteen years old or younger.

"Resident" is a person or family living within the corporate limits of the City of Helena.

"Senior" is a person 65 years of age or older.

"Young adult" is a person who is between the ages of 19 and 29.

Section 3. 

In accordance with the Resolution of Intent to Annex No. 19911 as amended by Resolution No. 20597, following is a restatement of each annexation condition with a response of satisfaction pertaining to this subdivision phase.

1. <u>City Services:</u> Each annexation phase of the Crossroads Amendment at Mountain View Meadows Subdivision must be adjacent to existing City limits and be served by city approved infrastructure.

<u>Response:</u> The above properties are adjacent to existing City limits and are served by approved infrastructure within Alice Street.

This annexation will only be effective upon completion of prezoning of the property and the following conditions:

1. <u>City Services</u>: Each annexation phase of the Crossroads Amendment at Mountain View Meadows Subdivision must be adjacent to existing City limits and be served by city approved infrastructure.

2. **Phases:** A legal description must be provided for each phase of the Crossroads Amendment at Mountain View Meadows Subdivision prior to its annexation.

3. <u>Fire Station Lot</u>: The proposed fire station lot must include all of the property located west of the drainage and south of the Crossroads Parkway and Jeanette Rankin Way intersection, as shown on the Crossroads Amendment at Mountain View Meadows preliminary plat, to provide a lot more suitable for operation of a Helena Fire Department fire station. This property must be dedicated to the City of Helena with the annexation of the first phase of the Crossroads Amendment at Mountain View Meadows preliminary plat.

4. <u>Review of New Construction</u>: The property owner must submit plans for review by the City of Helena for compliance with City infrastructure, zoning, and other Code requirements, provide proof of compliance with all building and fire codes for all new construction or remodels subsequent to the adoption of this resolution and prior to annexation of the property, and pay all fees for such reviews in the same manner and on the same basis as do owners of properties already in the City.

5. <u>Taxes and Assessments</u>: Taxes and assessments must be paid and current at the time of filing a Resolution of Annexation for each phase.

6. <u>Notice of Special Districts</u>: The property owner must waive the right to notification and protest and consent to the alteration of the Urban Forest Maintenance District and the Landfill Monitoring District in order to include the property in said districts prior to annexation, pursuant to §7-11-1023, MCA.

7. <u>Final Plat</u>: The property owners must meet the conditions of the Crossroads Amendment at Mountain View Meadows Subdivision preliminary plat approval prior to annexation. Annexation of the property is not effective until the final plat of the proposed

subdivision has been filed with the Clerk and Recorder of Lewis and Clark County, Montana.


8. <u>Completion of Conditions</u>: The property owners must notify City Planning in writing upon completion of the conditions for approval of annexation that must occur on or before the date of completion of conditions for subdivision of the property and subject to the same time limitations. If the conditions are not completed within that time frame, the City is under no obligation to annex the property and may discontinue any City services to the property, including water and sewer service.

Section 2. It is the intention of the Helena City Commission to supersede the conditions of annexation set by Resolution of Intention to Annex No. 19627.



In addition, local coordination plans are used by the State in their scoring metrics when considering all Capital Equipment Grant requests that are submitted by transit/transportation providers throughout the State of Montana. 	Coordination Plan maximizes Helena's collective coverage by minimizing duplication of services. Finally, the Transportation Coordination plan seeks to provide greater access to transportation services for people with disabilities, older adults, and individuals with lower incomes.		
Background Information:	Approval of the annual update to the Transportation Coordination Plan is both required and needed to complete our grant application package submittal.		
Proposal/Objective:	Approval of the Annual Update to the Transportation Coordination Plan specific to the 5311 Operating Funds.		
<u>Advantage:</u>	An annual update to the Transportation Coordination Plan satisfies a requirement specific to segment 5311 of Operating Funds which is then used to complete a Grant Request.

Coordination Overview

FY2025 Coordination Plan

HISTORY OF COORDINATION

The concept of coordination has been promoted since the late 1960s: however, it was not until recently that a real push for coordination, emphasized at the federal level, has been observed. More and more communities are realizing the scarcity of resources (fuel, vehicles, drivers, and funding) and that cost-effective and efficient delivery of services is vital if local communities are to continue to ensure access to vital human services, employment, recreation, and other opportunities and needs. Coordination should be looked at as a step-wise effort. It takes a firm understanding of local needs and resources to develop a plan that, in the end, increases the mobility of residents. The earliest coordination studies focused on a three-tiered continuum of service integration (as described in the Montana Coordinated Transportation Handbook):

- Communication informally working together towards a common goal;
- Collaboration this is the level most associated with the term Coordination. Collaboration involves the formalization of the process of two or more organizations working together;
- Consolidation is the merging of two or more organizations resources together for all participates.

Consolidation of resources is one which is not likely to be done in most communities. It requires that all agencies and providers to fall under one authority and it is difficult to obtain complete consensus for operations. However, the first two elements represent plausible ways to integrate services in a given area. The goal is to build on that cooperation between providers and human services to determine **if coordination is a viable option**. One of the greatest barriers to coordination is that the key stakeholders are not present or choose not to participate when planning of coordinated services is being done.

Levels of Coordination

There are varying levels of coordination across a broad spectrum of operating scenarios. Levels can range from very low levels of coordination, such as sharing rides on several different agency vehicles, to the extreme levels such as shared vehicles, shared maintenance, a brokerage established for all agencies, and others. The Capital Transit Advisory Committee (CHATAC) understands that coordination of services generally may take some amount of time and effort upon the part of the local providers and human service agencies.

Resource Management

The first set of resource management objectives, targeting greater efficiencies, focuses on reducing duplication and fragmentation in operating, administering, and funding transportation services. Specific strategies for achieving these objectives include reducing the following:

- Operating and administrative salaries;
- Capital costs on vehicles and other equipment; and
- Other operating costs such as maintenance, fuel, and insurance.

The second set of resource management objectives, targeting more productive or effective services, focuses on improving acceptability, accessibility, adaptability, affordability, and availability of transportation services within the area. Specific strategies for achieving these objectives include increasing the following:

- Days and hours of service;
- Service area;
- Rider types and purposes of the rides;
- The accessibility of vehicles and facilities for people with special needs;
- Public information concerning services; and
- Funding available to help pay the cost of the service.

COMMON COORDINATION STRATEGIES

Brokerage/Lead Agency Scenario

This coordination concept is possibly the most used in transit coordination. In recent years there has been a quantum leap in computerized dispatch and reservation technology. Many large transit systems across the United States have implemented this software to operate their complementary ADA Para- Transit service. The basic premise of this technology is that a customer can call in a reservation for service. This reservation is then placed into the computer which takes this reservation and combines it with other reservations to develop a transit route that emphasizes efficiency and effectiveness. In the past, as well as today in some circumstances, dispatching has been done manually. This can be done successfully if the dispatchers are knowledgeable of the area and the number of trips per day to be dispatched is relatively small. The advantage of the new dispatching software is that it can handle much larger trip numbers and, with GIS technology, can accurately develop a transit route that handles the most customers in a cost-effective manner. The dispatching software can also easily develop a multitude of reports that can be very useful in reporting the activities of the brokerage service to its member agencies as well as various states, local, and federal agencies.

Reservation software works in concert with the dispatch software and can be developed to store necessary information about customers for billing purposes. The reservation software can store more than one request from a customer for service and, since it is interconnected to the dispatch software, assures that these multiple trip requests are not misplaced or forgotten.

In FY2015, Capital Transit formally known as "HATS" purchased through the State of Montana Department of Transportation the RouteMatch scheduling/ dispatching software package for its operation. In FY 2017, the fixed route component was added.

Consolidation of Services

Consolidation of transit services differs from a brokerage/lead agency coordinated service in that under consolidation, social service agencies would turn over their transit vehicles, equipment, and other transit assets to one organization that would then provide the social service agency with transportation services. This would relieve the social service agency of the burden of providing and operating a transit service. The State of Montana is encouraging coordinated/consolidated rural transit in each of the state's transportation regions. Having a consolidated rural transit system allows social service agencies to concentrate on their primary goals as an agency, which generally does not include operating a transit system. Since many agencies receive their vehicles through state-administered federal grants, it is a simple matter of transferring the state-owned title to the new consolidated service. In cases where there is no longer any state equity in a vehicle or where a vehicle has been purchased with agency funds, these vehicles can be donated, leased, or sold to the consolidated transit service. Contracts are

negotiated between the social service agency and the new consolidated transit provider that will assure transit service to the social service agency at a reasonable cost.

Consolidated transit service would create "one-stop shopping" for local residents. Instead of going through a long list of potential providers, citizens would now only need to call one telephone number to get transportation. The new agency could acquire the reservation and dispatch software described earlier in this chapter to help provide efficient and effective service that should enable the transit service to charge less than it cost for the social service agency to provide the service.

Elements of a Coordinated Transit Plan

The guidelines specify elements that must be in a coordinated plan, but do not provide much structure in how planning must be done.

- Assessment of transportation needs for individuals with disabilities, older adults, and persons with limited incomes.
- An inventory of available services that identifies areas of redundant service and gaps in service.
- Strategies to address the identified gaps in service.

• Identification of coordination actions to eliminate or reduce duplication in services and strategies for more efficient utilization of resources.

• Prioritization of implementation strategies.

Some of these objectives where completed with Round 2 of the Helena Area Inclusive Transit Planning grant from Community Transportation Association of America (CTAA).

Outreach to Allow for Participation

The following list represents those agencies, providers, organizations, or groups that should be involved in a coordinated effort:

- Area transportation planning agencies
- Transit riders and potential riders
- Public transportation providers
- Private transportation providers
- Nonprofit transportation providers

- Human service agencies funding and/or supporting access for transportation services
- Other government agencies that administer health, employment, or other support programs for targeted populations
- Nonprofit organizations that serve targeted populations
- Advocacy organizations working on behalf of targeted populations
- Security and emergency management agencies
- Other appropriate local or state officials
- Tribes and tribal representatives
- Representatives of the business community
- Community-based organizations
- Economic development agencies
- Job training and placement agencies
- Elected officials

Capital Transit along with the members and leaders of our local transportation advisory council, Helena Area Transit Advisory Committee (HATAC) are working together to create an atmosphere where collaboration and even consolidation may occur. While this high goal remains out of reach currently, being open and searching for opportunities of collaboration can only improve our relationships.

Agencies involved in Coordination

City of Helena operates Capital Transit and works cooperatively with the below listed agencies to the extent possible for the public ridership.

Lewis and Clark County and City of East Helena

Lewis and Clark County is the City of Helena's primary partner in providing public transit. The county provides most of the match funds for the East Valley deviated-fixed route bus service which serves the area east of the City of Helena extending through East Helena and its eastern boundary is Lake Helena Drive. Canyon Ferry Road currently serves as the northern boundary and Hwy 12 serves as the southern boundary. The remaining match funding is provided by the City of East Helena. This service runs five days a week 7-11 AM and 1- 5 PM. Both Lewis and Clark County and the City of East Helena are active members of the HATAC.

Each program offers meaningful activities and work giving clients a sense of accomplishment and the opportunity to connect with peers and earn a paycheck. West Mont provides necessary transportation for client participation.

Supported Employment Services: Our job coaches and supported employment program managers help clients find and prepare for work in the community. Staff may provide transportation, help with interviews, assist with resume writing, oversee the development of social and "soft" skills, provide on-the-job training, give job coaching, etc., to ensure a successful placement.

Supported Living Services: Our supported living staff ensure those who need supports at home, get them and have the opportunity to live with dignity and self-determination. Staff teach the necessary skills to help clients live as independently as possible. This can include assistance with personal hygiene, household maintenance, safety, meal preparation, transportation, and shopping.

Description of Transportation Services

West Mont provides transportation to adults with disabilities who reside with us, attend our vocational and employment programs, participate in our supported services programs, and/or participate in other West Mont activities. Some clients can utilize Capital Transit for transportation; however, more and more, our medically fragile and physically challenged clients require staff assistance with transportation.

The West Mont fleet has a median age of 13 years and is comprised of 25 passenger vehicles, ranging from a 12-person bus to vans, and passenger cars. Our transportation services are demand-response 24 hours per day, 7 days per week. Transportation can include driving clients to their jobs, medical appointments, shopping, and on outings. In FY23, our organization saw an increase in transportation services (miles driven and passenger trips provided), continuing to rebound from the setbacks we faced during and after COVID-19. For the 12-months ending 6/30/23, West Mont vehicles:

- Provided 43,551 passenger trips (3,629 avg/month)
- Drove 179,355 miles (14,946 avg/month)

During the specified period, fourteen of our vehicles (56%) had 100,000+ odometer miles (100,881 odometer miles avg); one had 209,851 miles.

We occasionally receive requests from families or individuals needing transportation that are not enrolled in our services and we attempt to fulfill reasonable requests for assistance. For many years, West Mont has been an active member on the Capital Transit Advisory Council.

For FY23, we respectfully request a transit-size van. This van would be used by staff widely (a smaller pool of staff can operate our large buses) to transport clients with disabilities. It would be placed at our Hillside residence and supplement our fleet, eventually replacing a van with higher mileage.

Rocky Mountain Development Council, Inc. strives to improve quality of life and promote self-sufficiency for individuals and families.

Rocky Mountain Development Council, Inc. (Rocky)

Rocky strives to improve quality of life and promote self-sufficiency for individuals and families. Rocky is a Community Action Agency, formed in 1965 after President Lyndon Johnson declared a "war on poverty" in response to a national poverty rate of 19%. Several pieces of legislation were passed and this law is how Community Action Programs were born. As a community resource for individuals and families, Rocky is committed to improving quality of life, especially for low-income citizens, in Lewis & Clark, Broadwater, and Jefferson Counties. Currently, Rocky encompasses senior services, affordable housing, energy assistance, child care, Head Start and provides senior volunteer opportunities. Rocky has been serving young children during their early educational years and seniors in their most challenging years for 58 years.

Description of Transportation Services

Description of Transportation Services

Virtually all of Rocky's programs require transportation in one form or another. Rocky provides free transportation for Helena area senior citizens, within Helena city limits, participating in the following Rocky programs: Helena Senior Center (located in the Neighborhood Center) for lunch and other activities, Foster Grandparent Program, Senior Companion Program, Retired & Senior Volunteer Program, and Rocky's Agency on Aging.

Each year, Rocky helps over 700 seniors in Lewis & Clark, Broadwater, and Jefferson counties live as independently through the Meals on Wheels Program. Hot nutritious meals are delivered Monday through Friday, to seniors 60 and over who are home bound or have trouble preparing their own meals due to a disabling physical, emotional, or environmental condition. Rocky's Meals on Wheels program transitioned to primarily a volunteer-based model. Rocky also distributes shelf stable groceries through the Commodity Supplemental Food Program to income eligible seniors throughout the tri-counties, Elliston, and White Sulphur Springs bi-monthly.

Rocky is a partner in the Eagles Manor Complex, which currently includes the Penkay Eagles Manor (with 66 one-bedroom and single-room occupancy units), Eagles Manor II (with an additional 44 units), and Eagles Manor III (additional 30 units in the common complex), which is located at 715 North Fee in Helena. These units are dedicated to low-income seniors and adults with disabilities. The complexes are home to the frail elderly with a median age in the 80s. Most experience age-related disabilities and need walkers, wheelchairs, and portable oxygen tanks. Few drive or have access to personal vehicles. The Eagles shuttle is primarily used for senior outings, such as breakfast or lunch away from the facility.

Senior Companions and Foster Grandparents are senior volunteer programs for low-income seniors. Volunteers receive a small hourly stipend and are reimbursed for the mileage they log in support of providing service. Senior Companions provide in-home services, transportation, and run errands for their frail elderly clients. Not only do these programs serve the specific target population noted, they also provide a strong protective factor for the impoverished senior volunteers themselves.

It is the policy of Rocky to provide equal opportunity to all of its employees and clients and to assure that there shall be no discrimination against any person on the basis of sex, age, race, color, religion, creed, national origin, physical or mental handicap, marital status, political beliefs, veterans' status, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, or genetic information unless related to a bonafide occupational requirement.

Service Productivity

Rocky provided 1,422 one-way, passenger-trips between July 2022 and June 2023 (FY22). Currently, Rocky's shuttle provides an average of 238 rides per month or 2,843 annually. Rocky's current monthly ridership average is approximately 170 one-way rides. Our current ridership average is 24 passengers. Area demographics indicate that there will be a steady rise in the percentage of seniors in the population for the next 20 years, as reflected in the projected growth in the tri-county population aged 65 and older.

What we do and how we are involved in community services

Good Samaritan Ministries, motivated by Catholic Social Teaching, works in our community to advance family life, human dignity and the common good. We provide services to meet the physical, social, emotional, and spiritual needs of individuals and families of all faiths, especially those most in need.

Good Samaritan Ministries serves as the "social justice arm" of Helena's four Catholic parishes; St. Mary Catholic Community, Cathedral of St. Helena Parish, Our Lady of the Valley Parish, Ss. Cyril and Methodius Catholic Community. Likewise, GSM works closely with numerous other denominations.

GSM has been serving the people of Helena and surrounding communities for over 35 years with support from many denominations and partnering non-profit agencies within the community of

Helena. GSM serves all people regardless of faith, sex, race, orientation or creed. GSM is currently under the same 501c3 as the Diocese of Helena. The GSM Board and staff are working to obtain our own 501 in the future. GSM is fortunate to receive infrastructure support from the Diocese of Helena such as access to group health insurance and unemployment costs.

The Assistance Ministry

GSM's initial Assistance Ministry to the Needy started nearly 35 years ago. The Ministry is funded through various small grants, private donations, and fundraisers. Quarterly, when possible, the thrift store tithes 10% to the assistance ministry. The Assistance office is run by one person serving well over 1500 individuals and families annually in Lewis and Clark, Jefferson, and Broadwater counties. The program is Managed by a database system monitoring all clients, assistance giving with an elaborate reporting system.

GSM HUNTHAUSEN HOUSING LOAN/GRANT PROGRAM

The Hunthausen Fund was established by the Hunthausen Family and Good Samaritan Ministries to honor the social teachings and extraordinary work of Archbishop Hunthausen, Fr. John (Jack) Hunthausen and Sr.Edna Hunthausen. All three siblings are champions of Social Justice, working for the poor and needy in Montana. The Hunthausen Fund is a replica of The Hunthausen Fund in Seattle, WA. The Helena GSM fund began July 1, 2018 to award grants to help house the working poor in the Greater Helena Area. The fund is a "hands-up" approach to reducing homelessness. This grant is to help move men, women, and children from shelters and transitional housing into more stable and permanent housing.

The fund is two-part assistance with a grant and no interest loan enabling individuals and Families into a home of their own with a positive start to a stable living situation. The fund is unique to any other grant/or account of funds at GSM or other agencies in town because of the two components: a grant portion and a loan portion. The Hunthausen Fund preliminary supports the working poor who fall through cracks by not qualifying for funds due to their Income.

Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG)

The Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) is a HUD pass through grant from Rocky Mountain Development Council (ROCKY). GSM has managed and implemented ESG funds for the past six years. ESG requires a 100% matching grant, which GSM is easily able to provide through non-cash match from our Assistance Ministry. The grant is specifically to address Homeless Prevention and Rapid Rehousing. GSM has grown the grant from our starting award of \$5,000 initial start for GSM to this past year of \$57,000 serving forty-seven individuals and families. The grant is given to Montana Counties according to homeless populations.

Our Place Drop in Center

GSM took on Our Place December of 2019 in collaboration with the L&C County on a temporary basis. The purpose of Our Purpose is:

"We are peer led, peer run and our purpose is to provide a place for mental health and those with substance abuse issues to find support, friendship, advocacy, community integration, a sense of purpose and mutual belonging."

Our Place is open Monday through Saturday from 9:00-4:00 staffed by credentialed Peer Supports through the State of Montana. In addition to having a safe place to be, Our Place has optional groups, provides the obtaining of housing, employment, enrolling and transporting individuals to treatment of various types, to residential and returning from residential treatment, and other day to day needs. Our Place is a day treatment program only.

Street Outreach Program

The street outreach program is to meet individuals on the street, develop a relationship, and make referrals to other agencies. The street outreach staff ensures individuals are safe, provides transportation and follow up on individuals.

Good Samaritan is an active member of the HATAC

Ability Montana FY23 Coordination Plan

Ability MT is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit and one of four Centers of Independent Living (CIL) in the state of Montana. We are funded in part by the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 as amended in 1992 (Title VII – Independent Living Services) and the Montana Department of Public Health and Human Services (Disability Services Division). Ability MT provides Information and Referral, Transition Services, Peer Counseling, Independent Living Training, and Individual and Systems Advocacy to people with disabilities throughout southwest Montana, along with a Self Directed Personal Assistance program and a Veterans Directed program. We currently serve approximately 360 consumers in our 14 county area.

Ability MT has 1 accessible van in the Helena area. We are looking for grant funding to be able to operate this van during the evenings and weekends when Capital Transit is not operational.

Ability MT is an active member of the HATAC.

St. Peters Health/Hospital

St. Peter's Health supports the efforts of the Helena Transportation Advisory Council to assess and address local transportation needs. While we do not have transportation options for coordination (something we continually look at to help support our patients) we do greatly appreciate the work underway by our local HATAC and look forward to continued involvement.

Region IV Family Outreach, Inc.

About Family Outreach

Started in 1977, Region IV Family Outreach, Inc. is a state-contracted 501(c)(3) non-profit provider of intervention and support services for individuals with developmental delays and/or disabilities across the lifespan. Headquartered in Helena with branch offices in Bozeman and Butte, our operations cover twelve counties of southwestern Montana. We are proud to have been among the first non-profit organizations to follow the modern model of supporting and integrating people with disabilities in their communities, using an

inclusive approach that fosters dignity and respect for often marginalized groups. Our list of services currently includes Early Intervention, Vocational Rehabilitation, Applied Behavior Analysis, and more. We served a total of 626 clients in our fiscal year ending June 2023, and this number is expected to increase as we expand our workforce and improve internal processes. Family Outreach aims to make a lasting positive impact on the lives of people with disabilities, following our vision to "provide innovative quality services to support people in achieving their potential for a full life."

Description of Transportation Services

Most transportation needs within our organization fall into two categories: staff traveling to meet with a family or client at their home, or staff transporting clients from one location to another (e.g., to a job site or store). There are occasional staff trips between offices to facilitate administrative or other required tasks. Different service programs have different needs, and everyone shares the vehicles through a reservation system. For example, a Job Coach in Support Services may drive one company vehicle from Helena to Townsend to meet an adult client at their home and take them to a job site in Townsend. When work at the job site is completed for the day, the Job Coach drives their client home before returning to Helena with the vehicle. Meanwhile, a member of Early Intervention staff may drive another company vehicle to a family's home to perform an assessment of their young child as part of intake procedures, and then return it to the office when the assessment is complete. Company vehicles enhance the ability of Family Outreach staff to perform their duties and fulfill our shared mission to "empower individuals with disabilities and their families through supports for integration into the community."

Future Needs

Currently, we are raising funds to add a vehicle to our Helena fleet that features increased passenger capacity to help expand our Pre-Employment Transition Services program. As funding permits, we plan to gradually replace our higher mileage vehicles (100,000 miles +) in the coming years to ensure the reliability of our fleet and prioritize the safety of our staff and clients. We will explore hybrid or other options for any vehicle purchases to mitigate the ongoing financial impacts of increasing fuel costs.

YWCA Helena

YWCA Helena is a non-profit, charitable 501(c) 3 organization that strengthens women, children, and families' abilities. Our mission is to prevent homelessness, provide safe and supportive housing for women and children experiencing homelessness, and provide services that that restore hope, self-sufficiency, and happy and healthy lives. Together with YWCA USA and YWCAs across the country, we are dedicated to eliminating racism, empowering women, and promoting peace, justice, freedom, and dignity for all. For generations, YWCA Helena has provided safe and supportive housing and effective programs that empower women and promoted justice and dignity for all. Our programs continually evolve to meet the needs of our community. YWCA Helena provides shelter for homeless women and children with services and

therapies to help them in Substance Use Recovery and operates a Mental Health Center. The shelter averages 24 women and up to 20 children on any given day and the licensed, therapeutic childcare center can care for up to 44 children ages 0 - 6 years old.

<u>WINGS</u>

YWCA Helena is licensed as both a Substance Use Disorder Treatment Program and a Mental Health Center. As such, The WINGS (Women Initiating New Growth and Stability) program is part of an integrated array of services designed to support women, parents, and whole family care. Each WINGS participant is offered full wrap-around services including:

- Transitional housing support
- Individualized therapeutic treatments
- Peer support
- Co-occurring therapy groups
- Parenting classes
- Health and wellness education
- Co-occurring substance use and mental health therapy
- Access to community resources

Our participants are supported through their journey and given the tools needed to change their stories of trauma and homelessness to self-sufficiency and healthy lives.

Caterpillars Club House

The Caterpillars Club House is a licensed, therapeutic childcare that serves up to 44 children ages 0-6 years old. YWCA's Caterpillars Clubhouse provides children with an opportunity to learn, socialize, and develop in a supportive environment with specialized therapies and professional staff. Individual therapies include infant and childhood mental health assessment, case management, developmental screening, and access to onsite behavioral, occupational, speech and physical therapies. The Clubhouse staff is trained in early intervention from birth to age six and is equipped to support children that have endured trauma. We serve children who have mothers enrolled in YWCA Helena's WINGS program, children living at or below 185% of the Federal Poverty Line, and children who have experience with out-of-home placement or CPS involvement.

With success brings demand and YWCA Helena is in the process of expanding and opening a new therapeutic childcare facility that is located at Helena Housing Authority's Stewart Homes. This new childcare facility is located near Helena High School on Abbey Street. This program will enroll toddlers in a pre-school setting while the original Caterpillars Club House will enroll babies. It is anticipated that 16 preschoolers will be enrolled at Stewart Homes Childcare. Some children will be transferred from the YWCA Helena shelter and others will come from the community.

Caterpillars Parenting Center

YWCA's Caterpillars Parenting Center and Parent Coaching focuses on giving tools to help moms and dads succeed in their role as parents. Through classes, coaching, parent advocacy and liaison services we are creating lasting family bonds. Caterpillars Parenting Center services are provided free of charge to residents of YWCA Helena and the community at large.

Parenting Classes

Eight-week courses offered on an oncoming basis. Circle of Security and Love and Logic Classes aim to provide simple and effective strategies for parenting children, at any age.

Supervised Parenting and Parent Coaching

Supervised parenting offers non-custodial parents the opportunity to visit their children in a safe, controlled environment, following individual's parenting plan guidelines.

Safe Exchange

Safe Exchange allows parents to transfer a child back and forth without having to be in contact with one another, either by choice or court order. Caterpillars staff will work with each parent individually to establish the schedule if one is not already set up in a parenting plan.

<u>Request</u>

YWCA Helena has only one vehicle to transport women and children. This van was purchased with a childcare grant and is limited in size. This 6-passenger van was purchased in 2020 and is too small to accommodate the number of children that need to be transported to childcare, school, appointments, and events. With the additional Childcare Facility at Stewart homes, mothers and their children will need to be transported to and from that facility.

Additionally, women and their children staying at the YWCA Helena shelter often cannot participate in community events because of the limited transportation options in our community. Families served by YWCA Helena are considered extremely low-income and often have no form of private transportation. They rely on the transit system and YWCA Helena. The current space in the van allows for only one family per transportation need. Therefore, a 15-passenger van is needed to transport children between childcare facilities and transport women and their children to events and group meetings necessary for recovery needs of the family. The YWCA provides services to approximately 44 children in the childcare centers and 24 women and 20 children in our shelter programs.

YWCA Helena is an active member of TAC.

The CHATAC and Capital Transit have made numerous invites to groups and individuals who may have an interest in public transit. We had over 50 participants at the charrette to develop the proposed new two route fixed bus service. Over the past year we have had numerous individuals and organizations attend CHATAC meetings. Many do not attend every meeting due to other priorities and commitments but through our email list over 90 individuals and groups maintain connectivity with our CHATAC. Listed below are organizations that are engaged with the CHATAC and support the need for public transit but are unable to regularly attend CHATAC meetings.

Lewis and Clark Co. Treatment Court God's Love Inc. Helena's Business Improvement District (BID)

Public Sector Involvement

Public involvement for CHATAC meetings has been handled by the CHATAC. The CHATAC currently has over 90 individuals or groups who have signed up to be informed about the CHATAC meetings and items discussed. Minutes for each CHATAC meeting are kept. Transit items which go before

the lead agency for formal decisions are conducted through the City of Helena's city administrative meetings and city commission meetings process. All items before the City Commission are properly public noticed and minutes are kept.

Private sector agencies participating in coordination

<u>Helena Taxi</u>

Operates in City of Helena but does not participate in the HATAC

First Student

First Student provides rides for our school district and is not an active member of the HATAC.

Salt Lake Express (SLE)

Salt Lake Express provides intercity transportation from Helena to the cities of Butte, Great Falls and Salt Lake City. SLE also connects with Jefferson Lines to provide transportation east/west across Montana. SLE is currently not an active member of the HATAC. Salt Lake Express has permission use the west foyer entrance for ticket sales via an unmanned ticket kiosk; loading and unloading of passengers and their luggage only; there are no freight services provided by SLE at the Capital Transit Facility, SLE is not charged for the activities located in the Capital Transit facility. All operational costs associated with operating the Kiosk are reimbursed through the 5311 Operating Grant.

Plan for transit growth and/or increased ridership

The City of Helena/Capital Transits number one way to increase ridership numbers is to continue to grow and develop a more efficient transit service such as the recently implement Demand Response/Curb-to-Curb service for all ridership groups and potential service area and hours of operational growth. This goal remains the city's priority going into FY 2025 budget process.

SUMMARY

Coordination is a management strategy for improving the performance of various individual transportation services. It wrings inefficiencies out of the disparate operations and service patterns that often result from a multiplicity of providers. Overlapping, duplicate, and inefficient services can be combined for more efficient service delivery. As a result, coordinated services may achieve economies of scale not available to smaller providers. Coordinated services often provide a higher quality of service with greater efficiency that helps to stretch the limited (and often insufficient) funding and personnel resources of coordinating agencies. This plan will allow the CTAC to build upon existing associations to create a plan of action. Current / ongoing Coordination Efforts:

- 1. Capital Transit is committed to inviting all players to be part of the process of updating its Transit Plan in FY 2025. Capital Transit continuously gathers community input from the citizens of Helena. The ridership groups include current riders, potential riders, businesses, medical providers, appointed and elected officials, advocacy groups and the public. A key focus how Capital Transit continues to develop and serve the elderly and disabled while balancing public transportation daily.
- 2. Ongoing coordination with other local transportation provider such as but not limited to Rocky Mountain Development Councils (RMDC).
